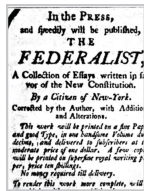

#### Why?

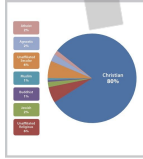
No common currency--individual states printed their own money

**WILLIAMSBURG.**  
*10th of 17th Virginia Declaration of Rights*  
 ...all men are born equally free and independent in inherent natural rights, of which they live or divert their pollutions among which is liberty with the means of acquiring and using and obtaining happiness and following power to valid, and consequently obliging themselves to their brethren and servants, ...  
 ...or might to be, indolent, ...  
 ...the general degree of happiness, ...  
 ...any government shall be found inadequate ...  
 ...defensible rights, to reform, alter, or abolish ...  
 ...which, not being defensible, or here ...
